Transplant Journey: In 2017, I was working out and had some trouble breathing. I was taken to the Army Hospital and they diagnosed me with congestive heart failure; my heart was operating at 75%. My journey took me way up north to the Mayo Clinic with trips to and from home. I was told that I also needed a liver as I had amyloidosis. My doctor had asked why I wasn't on the transplant list in Houston. Not only would I be closer to home but might have a better chance at receiving a heart and liver in the Texas Medical Center. So, I made my way back to Texas with that hope. I was placed on the transplant list in 2018 and was placed in Cardio ICU with a balloon pump for 3 ½ months, received a pacemaker and waited. I received my new heart and liver on January 21, 2019. Not only did I receive a new life, but I was able to give life. I was able to be a domino donor for a liver transplant. The liver that couldn't help me was able to help and save someone else!

What is the first thing you did after receiving your transplant?

I wanted to be a good steward of my new organs. I decided I needed to become and remain healthy. I bought an elliptical machine and started working out. I would ride my bike from Nora's Home to Methodist once I was able to do so for my appointments. And I also walked a lot. I would walk to Hermann Park and the Zoo since they were all close by. I also shared my story with other patients awaiting a transplant. It was important to me to do this and let them know about the process.

What would you say to someone considering becoming an organ donor?

Always consider being a donor! There are generations of hearts and I've met many kind donors
